It's great just to be nominated. No, really.

The ACC Drama Department was ecstatic with recent honors for their productions. The Drama program received several recognitions from the BroadwayWorld regional awards this past year for directing, lighting, set design and more.

"To have the work that our students take so much time producing be recognized by the community is a wonderful honor," said Drama Director Chris Tennison. "I think it shows the quality of the work we do at ACC Theatre, and I hope it encourages more folks to come and see what we have going on."

Tennison was nominated for best direction and best lighting. Coordinator D'Carrey Stell was nominated for best scenic design. The Addams Family production was nominated for best musical while The Diary of Anne Frank was nominated for best play.

"To be nominated for any kind of award was a true surprise."
Stell said. "It is not something that you go looking for if you are trying to do the craft correctly. The satisfaction of being part of the show is payment enough."



The Drama program had a packed schedule for 2023-24 that included productions of The Addams Family for the Fall semester, It's a Wonderful Life: a live radio play for the holiday season and The Diary of Anne Frank for the Spring. The Summer Children's Theatre Festival included performances of Alice in Wonderland and The BFG (Big Friendly Giant).

"We take great pride in producing professional quality theatrical experiences for our audiences and providing superior training to our students," Tennison said. "We look forward to continuing this tradition for years to come."

The Drama Department puts on three performances every year in the Fall, the holidays and in the Spring. The actors consist of students and members of the community.

Every summer the Drama Department also hosts the Summer Children's Theatre Festival, which includes two plays that feature local, aspiring young thespians (see page 24.)

ACC Alum Congressman Weber Honored

Rep. Randy Weber received the Outstanding Community
College Alumni award from the American Association of Community Colleges on April 16.

The Award Honors community college graduates who have made outstanding contributions in their chosen field at the national or international level.

"I'm truly honored to accept this award," Weber said during his acceptance speech. "It's humbling to stand before the very people who work every single day to shape the future of this country. You do all of this every day without headlines, but with heart and handson training and a whole lot of dedication. I know because I witnessed it up close and personal."

Weber attended Alvin Community College

from 1971-74 and continued his education at the University of Houston – Clear Lake where he earned a bachelor's degree in Public Affairs. He also met his wife Brenda while attending classes at ACC.

"This is such a great place in the community and it does a fantastic job," Weber said in a recent interview with ACC. "ACC holds a very important place in my heart. The impact that Alvin Community College now has on the area is unbelievable."

After starting and running his own business Weber Air and Heat, he became very involved in his community becoming a member of the Pearland

City Council from 1990-96.

In 2009, he won his first term as a State Representative to the Texas Legislature. After serving two terms in Austin, Weber turned his eyes toward Washington D.C. and was elected to Congress in 2012 where he currently serves as the representative for Texas District 14.

He has long been supportive of ACC and the ACC Foundation, using his 60th birthday as an opportunity to raise funds for student scholarships with a celebrity roast in 2014.

In 2023, Weber recognized ACC on the floor of Congress to honor the

college's 75th Anniversary.

"As an ACC alum I can personally attest to the transformative power of this institution," he said. "It laid the academic groundwork for my future."

New Career-Focused Programs


ACC continues to invest in training programs that lead directly to high-demand careers:

 Trains students to set up and manage sound, lighting, and video systems for concerts, theaters, sports events, and corporate productions.



Looking Ahead: Bachelor of Science in Nursing

With board approval secured, Alvin Community College is developing a Bachelor of Science in Nursing (BSN) to help meet local healthcare needs. The degree is currently progressing through the accreditation process with the Southern Association of Colleges and Schools Commission on Colleges (SACSCOC) and other regulatory bodies.

Noah Paul has always wanted to hear his voice coming over the radio. As a student at Alvin Community College, he has finally gotten his chance.


"I just love FM and AM radio stations," he said.

Every Monday morning, Paul takes his seat behind the microphone in the KACC 89.7 FM studios to introduce the music and talk about sports.

Paul is a student with the Skilled Training Rewarding Independence and Vocational Education (STRIVE)

program which provides vocational training for adults with intellectual disabilities with an end goal of transitioning students into the workforce. The program is approaching its 10th anniversary in 2025.

"Being able to collaborate with KACC, Noah has had the opportunity to learn more about what he is passionate about in the communications field in a hands-on and valuable way," said Mary Vlahovich, ACC STRIVE director. "By working with other departments, our students are given an opportunity to network with other students and instructors on campus."



Over the past 10 years STRIVE has helped many students improve their skills to find employment and better their lives.

"Our students have benefitted on many levels being in the STRIVE program," Vlahovich said. "Not only do they make lifelong connections within the program, but they are also increasing their independence by becoming part of the workforce. They are building confidence, increasing their skills and adding value to their communities."

Communications chair Jason Nichols said Paul has been a good addition to the KACC students who work in the broadcast studio.

"Noah is a great student," Nichols said. "He comes to his shift prepared every Monday. It's obvious to me that he's done research over the weekend, because he knows exactly what sports topic he wants to discuss."

Paul said he was inspired to take to the airwaves after starting a small YouTube channel in 2016. Being in the studio has been an awesome experience that he feels will help him in the future.

"I have learned a lot and had a lot of training with Jason about broadcasting," Paul said.

PURPOSE & PERSEVERANCE:

A Journey in PROCESS TECHNOLOGY

THIS PROGRAM GAVE ME THE CHANCE TO GIVE MY KIDS A CHILDHOOD I NEVER HAD.

Carline Njeri



By all accounts, Carline Njeru is a powerhouse. As an operator at Chevron Phillips in Pasadena and a key member of the fire and emergency response team, she handles high-stakes responsibilities in a field still largely dominated by men. But her path to success didn't start in a control room. It began thousands of miles away in Nairobi, Kenya.

Raised by her grandparents, Njeru came to the United States as a teenager after the loss of her mother. Her journey is marked by resilience, reinvention and a relentless desire to create a better life for her children.

"I always wanted to be an engineer like my grandfather," she said. "But when I came to this country, I met Robert Leal, a process operator and ACC alum, who introduced me to operations, and I realized that was exactly what I needed to do."

That realization led her to the Process Technology program at ACC, a decision that shaped her future in powerful ways.

Njeru speaks passionately about the program, which trains students not just to pass exams but to walk into industry jobs with confidence.



"The instructors have actually worked in chemical plants," she said. "They don't just teach from a book. They teach you to be an operator."

Hands-on training is a core element of the program. From full-scale equipment labs to the Polaris Unit outside campus, students interact with the same systems and tools they will encounter in the field.

"We touched the pipes. We learned how to trace lines. We used the DCS (Distributive Contrast System.) So by the time you get to a plant, it's not a shock. It's second nature," Njeru said.

The program also offers mock interviews with industry professionals, plant tours and strict training on workplace expectations. Even classroom policies mirror the real world.

"If you're five minutes late to class, it's marked as a missed day. That's how it is at work. If you're late, your coworker can't go home," she said.

The program is rigorous. Coursework includes chemistry, physics and instrumentation. Students must be ready to compete.

"The job market is mature. Only the best get hired," Njeru said. "Your GPA matters. You have to bring your A-game."


She completed her degree with minimal student debt thanks to scholarships offered by the college. Today, she has a job that allows her to provide for her family and build a future she once only imagined.

"This program gave me the chance to give my kids a childhood I never had," she said.

As a woman in the field, Njeru has found a welcoming environment at her company.

"They treat you like one of the team," she said. "It's like going to work with family."

For Carline Njeru, ACC's Process Technology program was more than a path to a paycheck. It was a path to purpose.

INGREDIENTS

- 2 cucumbers (depends on size), washed and sliced
- 2 tomatoes, quartered (depends on size) or 1 pint cherry tomatoes, halved
- 1 tbsp green onion, chopped
- 1 red or yellow onion, thinly sliced
- ½ tbsp dill, chopped
- 1 yellow bell pepper, thinly sliced
- ½ tbsp olive oil
- ½ cup white sugar
- 1 cup red wine vinegar
- ¼ cup water
- Salt and pepper, to taste

- 1. Combine all ingredients in a large bowl and toss well.
- 2. Refrigerate for at least 20 minutes before serving (overnight is even better).

Here's a look at some of the meaningful ways the Foundation made an impact during the 2024–2025 academic year!

Opening Doors: The First Step Award

The First Step Award continues to inspire new beginnings. Created to encourage students to take their very first college course, this scholarship saw a record number of applicants this year. In total, \$135,000 was awarded to 270 first-time students beginning their higher education journey. A follow-up survey revealed that the majority of recipients said the award directly influenced their decision to enroll at ACC—a powerful testament to the difference even one class can make.

Honoring a Life: Ivan's Boots Scholarship

In Spring 2025, the Foundation proudly introduced a heartfelt new scholarship: Ivan's Boots. Established by Tiffany and Jeremiah Ermenc in memory of their son, Ivan—who tragically passed away just days into his first job. The scholarship honors his excitement for industrial work and the pride he felt about buying his first pair of steel-toe boots. In Ivan's honor, multiple \$250 awards are given to students in ACC's industrial programs to help purchase essential boots or tools as they prepare to enter the workforce. This meaningful tribute ensures Ivan's legacy supports others chasing the same dream.

Lending a Hand: The MaSH Scholarship

Michael and Susan Hoover, longtime supporters of ACC, launched the new MaSH Scholarship this year to help students who just need a little support to stay on track. Many ACC students are hardworking and committed, but face unforeseen challenges—car trouble, medical issues, or family responsibilities—that can threaten their ability to continue school. The Hoovers wanted to make sure that when life gets tough, students don't have to choose between education and survival. Thanks to their generosity, several students received assistance during the MaSH Scholarship's inaugural year.

Crisis Support: Emergency Fund

The Foundation's Emergency Fund continues to be a lifeline for students facing obstacles to their education. Whether it's help with car repairs, a utility bill, temporary housing, or even a bicycle to get to class, these small but vital grants are often the difference between staying enrolled or dropping out. Working hand-in-hand with ACC's dedicated counselors, the Foundation ensures students in crisis are quickly connected with the resources they need.

Fighting Food Insecurity: The Student Resource Center

When ACC's counseling team saw the growing need for basic student support, they teamed up with the Foundation to create a centralized Student Resource Center, launched in Fall 2024. Designed as a "one-stop shop," the center offers snacks, school supplies, clothing, toiletries, and more—all free to students in need.

To expand the center's reach, counselors and the Foundation applied for a \$5,000 grant from TDECU, a committed community partner, gladly awarded the grant.


The funding allowed for the purchase of a refrigerator, freezer, food bins, and canned goods displays—transforming the center into a place where students experiencing food insecurity can access fresh, nutritious food. Thanks to a new partnership with the Houston Food Bank, those shelves will stay stocked, and hungry students will have one less thing to worry about.


So many remarkable things are happening at ACC thanks to the support of the ACC Foundation—and you can


